St. Martin-in-the-Fields Episcopal Church Annual Meeting 2014

The Annual Meeting of St. Martin-in-the-Fields Episcopal Church was held January 26, 2014, in the East Parish Hall. There being a quorum present, the meeting opened with prayer by Interim Rector Mike Wallens at 12:30 PM. Senior Warden Bob Bess chaired the balance of the meeting. LC Crowley nominated Glenda Morehead to serve as clerk for the meeting, and she was elected by acclamation. Phyllis Bess moved Jim Wilson be elected to serve as parliamentarian for the meeting and he was elected by acclamation.

DJ Mitchell moved the minutes of the 2013 Annual Meeting be approved as printed in the 2013 Annual Parish Report booklet. The motion was seconded and the minutes were approved.

Current Vestry members present were introduced and acknowledged by a round of applause by the parish members present. Those whose terms end today are Steve Anderson, Gary Grant, Linda Seeber and Becky Snell. Gary Grant has moved away and Becky Snell had a family emergency and was not present at today's meeting. Those going off the Vestry were presented with personalized bookmarks stitched by Tricia Raffaell.

2014 Vestry Election

The Senior Warden introduced the nominees for Vestry: Bob Blomstrom, Gil Kleinwechter, Elizabeth Mason and Cyndy Sulots. There being no further nominations from the floor, Glenda Morehead moved the nominations be closed and the nominees elected by acclamation. The motion was seconded and the nominees were elected by acclamation.

2014 Delegate Election

The Senior Warden introduced the nominees for 2014 Diocesan Delegates: Phyllis Bess, Richard Cabes, Lisa Neilson, Becky Snell and Joel Walker as delegates and Susan Kleinwechter as alternate. Since St-Martin-in-the-Fields is entitled to 6 delegates, Phyllis Bess nominated Kathy Watson to serve as delegate. There being no further nominations from the floor, Glenda Morehead moved the slate, with the addition of Kathy Watson, be elected by acclamation. The motion was seconded and the nominees were elected by acclamation.

Financial Report

Senior Warden Bess announced that the Vestry has voted to adopt the 2014 budget shown on p 16 of the 2013 Annual Report booklet. Treasurer Diana Panther went over the budget.

Stewardship Report

Chair Aubrey Hardman reported that stewardship at St Martin is changing from a set period of the year to a year-long activity. The committee plans to foster holy habits in the congregation. Some of these habits are to be thankful, trust God to provide, be content, be a faithful example, give time and talents, give treasure.

Timeline for the Interim Period and New Rector Search

Interim Rector Wallens reminded the parish that the timeline from one Rector to another is based on the actions of the Holy Spirit as much as on our work. Canon to the Ordinary Janet Waggoner has said there are two things that must be done by May – a Profile Committee must be formed and that committee must create a profile of St. Martin-in-the-Fields "warts and all" – who we were, who we are and who we want to become. The profile must be completed in time for Waggoner to take with her to the meeting of diocesan Transition Officers of our province. At that meeting the transition officers share information on parishes that are looking for clergy and clergy who are looking for new parishes. The profile will also be placed on the national website where it will be available to clergy who are looking. After that meeting Waggoner will bring to the Search Committee the names of any eligible candidates for Rector. Anyone wanting to serve on the Profile Committee is asked to contact Senior Warden Bess by the end of the week. The Search Committee will be elected by the Vestry at their February meeting. It is feasible that a new Rector could be chosen by June. If the process doesn't work by then, it will need to wait till fall.

Presentation and Discussion of Vision, Mission and Core Values Statements Shown on p 11 of the Annual Report Booklet

After table top discussions the Vision Statement and Core Values were endorsed by the parishioners present for adoption by the Vestry. Further discussion is needed regarding the Mission Statement. Town Hall Meetings will be held between services and after the 10:30 service on February 16 to provide Vestry members a sense of parishioners' wishes before they vote to adopt a Mission Statement.

Worship and Christian Formation Proposals for Lent through Easter

The Interim Rector announced that changing Sunday school to 9:30 from the previous practice of holding Sunday School during the 10:30 service has prompted extensive discussion. Complaints have centered mainly around feelings that 2 hours is too long to spend at church and that 9:30 is too early. The Christian Education director and the clergy are looking at options for the Lenten season. Parishioners were asked to present their suggestions. The final decision on Christian education for children and adults will be made by the staff with input from the teachers.

Announcements

Parishioners were referred to the printed reports in the 2013 Annual Report booklet. One report that was submitted but not included in the booklet was that from Sisters of the Spirit. Joy Malmgren displayed the short sleeve shirts that have been purchased for the Presiding Bishop's visit. The shirts will go on sale next Sunday at \$15 each. The diocese has changed the structure of the deaneries.

This past year I have again been honored to serve as your Deacon. The list of activities below would not have happened without excellent and selfless commitment from many individuals who carried the load for each of the projects in which I was involved. I especially want to thank Corrie Cabes, Fr. Mike Wallens, and Bob Bess for their support and encouragement.

The activities I have been involved in:

- · Worship services each Sunday at 8:30 and 10:30 am except for once a month when I attend other churches in the diocese. I am also serving our Bishop at worship services when requested. I am occasionally at Saturday 5:00 services when requested.
- · Preaching once a month including the Saturday service. Occasional guest preaching at other parishes has been fun.
- Drive-by ashes on Ash Wednesday. This is a ministry I want to continue, and Susan Kleinwechter has been so wonderfully helpful in assisting with signs and directing folks into our parking lot, as well as setting up news coverage that drew a lot of local attention to our efforts.
- · Planning a new book study for 6 weeks this lent season on "Same Kind of Different as Me," a wonderful story about our Fort Worth Union Gospel Mission (UGM). More book studies to come.
- · Follow-up tours of the UGM and its complete facility as requested. We need to do more of these.
- Several trips to the UGM to visit with staff and discuss projects (and deliver food). Also delivery of the shoes we gathered for the men of UGM. We did a terrific coat drive for the Mission that took over 100 coats to them in two SUV loads. We were helped by our Fever Soccer team and their parents.
- · Follow-up of 2013 Christmas family gifts and food support. We continue to follow Hispanic families in need and support them with food, clothing, and funds. This effort was coordinated with Deacon Cindy Ruiz.
- · Working with Joy Malmgren and others on our mission and outreach group at St. Martin-in-the-Fields has been especially rewarding. Those folks, especially Joy, carry most of the burden, and I simply serve where I can. I think 2015 will see even more activity by our group and I look forward to wider support from our parish family. We have several new projects that we will announce soon.
- · Serving on several diocesan committees including the Commission on Ministry, where I am the new chair-person. I also serve as chair of the Disciplinary Board, which we always hope has no business to conduct in the coming year.
- I am blessed to have been able to help out with pastoral care much more in 2014. My hospital visits and counseling sessions have increased, and I hope are helpful to all I minister to. I am also blessed to have planned, presided and preached at weddings and funerals this past year, and am ready to do what I can to help with these milestones in our lives whenever called upon.

Senior Warden Report

Looking back on 2014 we should all rejoice in the conclusion of our search and the beginning of a new era at St. Martin-in-the-Fields with the Reverend Scot McComas. The interim period is over and we can continue our mission with a new leader in place. Scot will officially begin on February 9, 2015. My thanks to the Profile Committee, led by Jim Wilson, and the Search Committee, headed by Richard Cabes, for all of their hard work and dedication which made calling our new rector possible. I would also like to thank our Treasurer, Diana Panther, who has been a tremendous help to me all year long. My leadership as your Senior Warden is a function of all the hands who offered me help and support as I have made this journey. Let me just offer a brief summary of some of the events and changes which have occurred this past year.

- The Presiding Bishop of the Episcopal Church visited the Diocese of Fort Worth and joined us at St. Martin-in-the-Fields to celebrate Holy Communion on February 9.
- St. Martin's School financials are now combined with those of St. Martin-in-the-Fields financials. This change was recommended by the audit committee.
- Our partnership with Fever United Soccer continues, with great benefit for our church, as we practice good stewardship with our abundance.
- The Third Annual Festival in the Fields was made possible by many volunteers, led effectively by Dick Seeber. This event was well attended, and all proceeds helped with the addition of play equipment for the playground shared by our school and church. Many parents of our preschoolers attended and volunteered at the Festival this year.
- Corrie Cabes became Children and Youth Minister. At the March 16th vestry meeting, the vestry approved a change in title and responsibility for Corrie. This exciting change allows Corrie more time to work with children in the school as chaplain and at church every week.
- St. Martin-in-the-Fields sent 2 teens to the Episcopal Youth Event at Villanova in July.
- We hired Anika Barbarito to become our new administrative assistant. She joined us after the departure of Michelle King to become an administrative assistant for the Diocese of Fort Worth in February.
- We hired Jan Rees to become the business manager for the church. This has been a very positive step toward St. Martin's taking better care of our volunteers.

- Mayra Carballo became the director of the nursery as of August 1. Heather Ripple resigned on July 31 to spend more time with her family. We thank Heather for her service.
- Cindy James has taken over as Interim Director of the St. Martin's Preschool. The school continues to be a wonderful place for children, and we appreciate Cindy's leadership.
- St. Martin's Preschool celebrated a ribbon cutting with the Keller Chamber of Commerce. This event was well attended by people from all over the area.
- We said farewell to The Reverend Amy Haynie on June 1. She decided to spend more time with her family over the summer, as she began looking for new opportunities.
- We added a new play area to our playground for use by the St. Martin's School children.
- The Reverend Mike Wallens resigned as interim rector, effective November 9. Mike
 accepted an offer to become the Priest in Charge at a parish in the Diocese of Dallas.
 His leadership and spiritual guidance has been appreciated by everyone who worked
 with him at St. Martin's.

I am grateful to a forward -thinking and hardworking vestry. My thanks to a Junior Warden who has supported me every day and helped improve our building and grounds. Thanks to our clergy and staff for hard work and for going above and beyond on many occasions. I cannot adequately express my gratitude to the hundreds of volunteers who make our parish function every day. Thanks be to God for your grace, guidance and wisdom.

This was a pretty good year for building maintenance as we didn't have any extraordinary costs this year. The A/C units held up and I believe we are winning the battle of the roof leak. A couple of electrical problems were fixed. We were only just slightly over budget this year due to a couple of water leaks and utility rate increase. In the spring there was a change in the janitorial service to Knight Janitorial. There is an Eagle Scout project in the works that will help beautify the outdoor worship area. I am very grateful for the work Steve Anderson has done over the last year for running the Green Team, which was kept under budget, the grounds are looking good. Steve also headed up maintenance of the Memorial Garden. I cannot say thank you enough! This past year was definitely a learning experience for me and I am grateful for all the help I had and will do all I can to assist the next Junior Warden. Thank you. Joe Panther - Jr. Warden

Treasurer's Report and Financial Statements FYE December 31, 2014

Total Contributions for 2014 were under Budget by \$5,416. Pledge Contributions were under Budget by \$53,036 or 13.6%. However, Helping Hands Contributions of \$42,195 and other special contributions offset this deficit. The Academy's revenue was under Budget by \$33,834 due to a reorganization of the school's direction. Other income of \$43,131 includes grants received from the Diocese for outreach, donations from trusts, festival receipts, building use and various refunds and tax credits. Overall, income was .2% under plan.

Total Operating Expenses were under budget by \$10,458. Significant expenses in 2014 included increased utility costs and search committee costs while savings were realized in payroll for Mother Amy's departure and the Academy which was \$7,806 under budget in school expenses. Overall, Operating Expenses were 1.6% under budget for the year. The Academy experienced a loss for the year of \$26,028. This loss includes the \$10,000 of shared expenses (building) with the church. Total Net Income (which includes the Academy) was \$9,126.

The 2015 approved Budget reflects a 7.9% overall decrease in income compared to 2014 actual, due to the extraordinary income that is reflected in 2014. There are a total of 107 pledging units for 2015, compared to 113 in 2014. Pledges for 2015 are 4.17% higher than actual pledges received for 2014. Included in budgeted income are anticipated Helping Hands campaign funds of \$27,813. The church received \$42,195 of Helping Hands campaign funds in 2014. Total income is budgeted at \$575,457 for the year.

Although the Academy's budget reflects an operating loss of \$12,028, it is anticipated that it will be made up in school fundraisers, which is reflected as fundraising income in the budget. Operating expenses are budgeted at \$575.657 or 6.5% less than 2014 actuals.

Once again, the Finance Team performed their volunteer duties conscientiously and timely. The work performed by the team, Glenda Morehead, Helen Simpson and Helen Carr is superb and is greatly appreciated. The addition to church staff of Jan Rees as our part-time Financial Manager has added tremendously to the financial guidance to the church and oversight of all transactions as they occur. The Finance Committee, who oversee the overall Finance function was chaired by Jack Bailey and included Bob Bess, Paula Jefferson, Jim Wilson Aubrey Hardman and myself. Starting in February 2015, Doug Watson will assume the role of Treasurer, bringing his audit, prior church treasury experience and enthusiasm to St. Martin's financial team.

St. Martin Episcopal Preschool Board Report

In January of 2014, St. Martin-in-the-Fields Church (herein after "the Church") reaffirmed education as one of its core values. The Preschool had seen a steady decline of enrollment, it was functioning without a curriculum, and the playground was not only inappropriate for older preschoolers, but also not in compliance with state safety standards. Additionally, the Church and the school were not functioning as a cohesive unit. The leadership environment at the school was negative and there were no plans for the future.

Since the change of leadership at the school in May of 2014, there has been a profound revitalization of the school through the efforts of the Preschool staff, Church Parishioners and the Board.

Accomplishments:

Cleaning, Reorganization and Inventory of the Preschool:

The staff at the school has worked hard to create a warm, inviting environment for the children. Rooms and toys have been cleaned, organized and the entire school facility brightened.

An Accredited Curriculum:

The Preschool currently uses an accredited Episcopal curriculum provided by the Southwest Association of Episcopal Schools.

Creation of a Resource Room:

In "Ms. Regina's Resource Room" the children have been exposed to science and technology.

The Formation of a PTO:

Katie Frieburg, a parent at the school, is the current PTO president. At present each of the classes now has a "Room Mom" to help coordinate class parties etc. Robin Strand has taken over teacher appreciation activities. She arranged for the purchase of end of the year gifts for the staff. Both Katie and Robin will continue in their respective roles in the spring of 2015.

Revitalized Internet Presence:

The website has been rebuilt and includes a virtual tour of the facility. A Facebook Page has also been created. These tools allow for parents and parishioners to remain informed about the school. This social media presence also allows potential families to learn about the church and school.

An Age-Appropriate, Safe Playground has been Installed:

Through some funds on hand at the school, and extensive support from the church parishioners, Vestry and from the Diocese of Fort Worth, we were able to install new playground equipment.

Involvement with other Preschool Directors within the Surrounding Community: Earlier this year, Ms. Cindy James was invited to join a group for local preschool directors. In her role as Interim Director she has been a dedicated, positive representative of the school. We have every reason to believe that the relationships she is building will lead to an enhancement of the school and an increase in enrollment though referrals.

Solidarity, Support and Mutual Respect between the Church and School: The opportunity for a greater presence by the Church in the day to day functions of the school has yielded a major change on the environment and outlook of all. The children have benefited from Chapel increasing to five days a week. Additionally, school functions such as graduation and the Christmas program are occurring in the sanctuary. Additionally, St. Martin functions as a mascot for the school.

Enrollment and Activities:

In September 2014, enrollment was at 30 children. We are proud to say that as of December 19, 2014, enrollment was at 39 students. We scheduled tours in the following week for 3 additional prospective students. We have every reason to believe that there will be a significant increase in enrollment in the coming semester.

Our most recent activities at the school were Breakfast with Santa, the Playground "Grand Opening" and the Christmas Program.

Monthly reports are made to the Vestry to keep them apprised of the ongoing activities at our school. I appreciate this opportunity to report to the Parish as a whole how far we have come in one year. I would like to express my profound thanks to both the Vestry and the Parish for their support of the school during the past year. There is a vibe of excitement in the air and the future looks bright!

2014 Communications Report

Who we are & what we're about:

The communications report is provided by Susan Kleinwechter on behalf of the Communications Development Committee. This committee supports the church staff in strategy, publishing, and analysis for the digital communications of our church. Committee members are Susan Kleinwechter, Annette Duff, Gil Kleinwechter and Will Duff. Of the committee members, Susan and Annette are the largest committee contributors, but Gil and Will support with much-needed technical expertise. You can reach Susan, Annette, and Gil by email at webmaster@stmartininthefields.org.

This report covers the communications work of the church, not just the committee, so it reflects efforts of Children and Youth Minister Corrie Cabes, Parish Administrator Anika Barbarito, former Interim Rector Mike Wallens, and former Associate Rector Amy Haynie, and former Office Administrator Michele King.

How you can help our church communications:

The communicators at St. Martin-in-the-Fields continue to need the assistance of the entire parish to press forward with the transformation of our communications- to tell a compelling story of our community in fellowship, service, and worship that is as useful for seekers and visitors as it is for members. Some specific ways everyone can help are:

- Share stories about the ministries you're involved in and their activities and events
- Capture and share quality photos a picture is worth a thousand words
- Share personal stories about your life and faith
- Keep the information about your ministries always up-to-date and inviting
- Make communications the first topic in your planning
- Follow up with stories after events so we can share our successes and fun
- Subscribe to the website to receive updates directly via email
- <u>Like our Facebook page</u>, <u>turn on notifications from our page</u>, and interact by liking and sharing
- Subscribe to our emails via Constant Contact
- Open, read and click through our emails for more information about what's going on. We've determined our readers are mostly skimming, relying on titles and excerpts and only getting part of what's going on.
- Tell the church office when your name, address, phone, email, or family status changes
- Boldly tell us that you want to become a pinner on a group board on Pinterest!

The single biggest thing that made an impact on our 2014 church communications was this: early, quality, thorough planning. Better planning simply yields better communications. When ministry leaders and event planners plan and communicate details early, rather than have information trickle out or be begged for by staff or communications volunteers, it makes a great difference in how we reach people and what we can accomplish together in Christ's mission.

What we did

Building on new work and new organization begun in 2013, most of our 2014 efforts were in the day-to-day, week-to-week grind necessary to transform our church's publishing strategy to

- Match the pace and tempo of modern communications
- Use our new website as the informative and authoritative hub for communications

Our 2014 work involved the church website stmartininthefields.org, Facebook page facebook.com/stmartinkellertx, the preschool Facebook page facebook.com/stmartinSchool, the preschool's Twitter account @StMartinSchool, email marketing through Constant Contact, managing photos in our Flickr account flickr.com/stmartinkellertx, and dabbling in Pinterest to pin VBS decorating ideas. We were responsible also for user account/mail administration in Google Apps. We made a foray back into print publishing with strategy for the Seasons seasonal newsletter; Anika orchestrated and made most of the Seasons magic happen, with content provided by parishioners and staff.

Preschool Website

This spring, we developed a new preschool website in WordPress and launched it toward the end of the spring semester. Hand-in-hand with that went launching the preschool's Facebook page and Twitter account, and church email accounts, and training staff to work with those. Over the summer, in consultation with school staff, we moved the website from stmartinacademy.com to its new and current domain stmartinepiscopalschool.org. Also over the summer, management of the website and social media was handed over to a staff member involved with developing preschool marketing, and that staff member redesigned the school website with a new theme. However, as school restarted the staff position was vacated and the website came back to Susan for oversight and minor updates. It remains a static website with infrequent publishing. The communications development committee, lacking time and energy to drive it forward, recommend three things to the Vestry: that the website be redone as the school marketing is revisited, that it use the same theme as the church website for ease of maintenance and a cohesive look, and that someone be hired to manage all the communications channels of the school and church. Relying so heavily on volunteers for the most visible and mission-critical elements of our church and school is not advised.

Training & coaching

We did a lot of training with Corrie and Anika in the church office, because we want our staff to be proficient with writing for the web and the details of posting. Giant kudos to them, because they have strategically ramped up detailed planning, been patient in receiving and acting on suggestions on how to improve writing and visual content, and they've been diligent in the details of publishing and chasing down content.

Church Website - stmartininthefields.org

Volume of posts

In 2014, there were 409 new posts, growing the total archive of this site to 625 posts. Compare that to 2013, where there were 170 new posts. Corrie and Anika publishing more and Father Mike writing a lot made a big difference in the increase in the number of posts. After all, frequent quality content is what wins the internet.

Views

Stmartininthefields.org was viewed about 43,000 times in 2014, up from 16,000 times in 2013. If it were a concert at Sydney Opera House, with seating capacity of 2,700 people, it would take about 16 sold-out performances for that many people to see it.

The busiest day the year was December 3, 2014 with 726 views. The most popular post that day was <u>Announcing our new rector - the Rev. Scot McComas</u>. That was great news to share, and well-received! Facebook paid off big in taking people to our website.

Constant Contact Email


St. Martin's uses Constant Contact to do a weekly email and other announcements to our open subscriber list. The church sent 111 Constant Contact emails in 2014, and the year ended with 388 subscribers.

In spring of 2014, we made 2 changes to our weekly newsletter format. The first was simple: we moved from a 2-column layout to a 1-column layout that would be easily read on mobile devices. The second had more strategic impact - we started pulling our website posts into the newsletter with a "post title and excerpt," where a summary of information is provided and more information is available by clicking the title link or ellipsis hyperlink to the full website post. This second change was part of our strategic shift to a hub-and-spoke communications model, where our website is the hub and primary part of our communications, and we use other spokes like our weekly news email and Facebook to take us back to the website hub.

Overall our email open rate is adequate, even high for nonprofit religious organization, but our click rate is poor. For the last 3 months of 2014, the open rate was 41.3% and the click rate was 11.9%. That tells us that people are skimming, relying on excerpts for information. It has been challenging to craft good excerpts with essential information to best utilize the title-and-excerpt format.

Facebook Page - facebook.com/stmartinkellertx/

Our Facebook fan base grew in 2014 from around 150 fans to 184 fans. English-speaking, local people dominate our fan base. 70% of our fans are female, 28% are male. The age breakdown of our page fans vs Facebook's demographic is:




In the 28-day period from December 14 through January 11, *our Facebook posts were served to 6449 people in the United States*. Compare that to the 388 Constant Contact email subscribers and 41.3% open rate as we try to regularly reach people every week and you can begin to understand why social media matters to a church. But don't get happy about that monthly 6449 people reached number, because...

We're reaching fewer people on Facebook these days! Our Facebook organic reach is declining, as most nonprofits experienced in 2014. Why? Facebook algorithmically decides which stories appear in the news feed of the average user. That means Facebook looks very closely at the posts our page makes, and Facebook will show fewer of our posts automatically on our fans' timelines. Facebook's goal is to show each user the posts that are most relevant to and

engaging for them. Facebook downplays messages put out by a page in favor of posts from individuals you regularly interact with and in favor of paid content. The less you interact with a page like ours, the less you and your friends who also like our page will hear from it. It is likely that in the near future we will need to pay for Facebook advertising to have a meaningful reach.

But you can help us reach more people on Facebook! Here are three things you can do to make sure our Facebook posts reach you:

- 1. Go and like our page facebook.com/stmartinkellertx
- Tell Facebook to deliver them all to you. Choose to Get Notifications as an option from the Liked button on our page
- 3. Regularly interact with our content –like, comment on and share our posts.



And frankly, moving forward in 2015, we need to delete our old Facebook group. Our church's Facebook presence would be strengthened to delete the little-used public group "St. Martin In The Fields Episcopal Church" whose admins are no longer attending or very active at our church and to encourage subscription to our page. Having 2 presences in one social channel is confusing; each is a unique audience; and many of our people on Facebook don't know the difference between a Facebook group and a page. From Facebook's early years, groups were the only vehicle for an organization to aggregate an audience. Currently Facebook groups serve no purpose for evangelism, as they are members-only. The best use of a Facebook group is for small-group communications around specific interests or for specific networks, such as a ministry area or Bible study, where peer-to-peer communications is desired.

St. Martin's uploaded and shared 1650 photos in 43 albums on social site <u>Flickr</u>, where full-resolution photos can be downloaded and shared to other social sites. Flickr doesn't offer us statistics, but it's #4 on the list of websites our stmartininthefields.org visitors click away to in the last year.

Pinterest - pinterest.com/stmartinkeller/

Here lies an opportunity! We have dabbled in Pinterest in creating Vacation Bible School decorating boards to collect and exchange ideas. On those 2 VBS boards, we've had more than 60,000 views of our meager 200 pins. So, who wants to collaborate and pin for our church on group boards? Email communication@stmartininthefields.org if you do! With a strategy and a team of pinners, we could engage in digital evangelism on Pinterest to identify who and what we believe in, reflect our culture and mission, share deep thoughts and challenging ideas, and inspire our congregation and community.

Children and Youth Minister/School Chaplain Report

Mission

To provide opportunities for spiritual growth in young people through Sunday school, Chapel, seasonal events, youth-led worship and outreach. Specifically:

-providing a safe environment for children and youth formation that is functioning, unified and nurturing.

-making opportunities available to young people to practice a growing faith through service, giving and creative worship.

2014 Highlights

Sunday school kicked off with Fun Faith Field Day on September 14. A superhero sized blessing started the festivities that day with Sunday school volunteers sporting superhero t-shirts, costumes and capes. Over 50 children, teens and volunteers joined in a field day with themes from Genesis. Sunday school has featured curriculum called "Faithweaver" for nursery, tweens and teens. This curriculum walks children and teens through the Bible in three years. Pre-K to 3rd grade children learn Bible truths in an interactive way with Godly Play. A spring confirmation retreat was held in April and five young people were confirmed by Bishop High.

During the summer, children's chapel welcomes a good following of children and teens who serve as chaplains. This service features a simple liturgy, songs, art and short homilies following the liturgical calendar and readings.

The Episcopal Youth Event was held in Villanova, PA with two youth in attendance from St. Martin's, the only church to send teens to EYE in the Fort Worth Diocese.

Teens and children have participated in special services from a Good Friday family service to a youth sermon journeying through the seasons of Advent, Christmas and Epiphany. Looking towards Lent, the teens are planning a Good Friday family service. Families and children will experience a service featuring interactive stations to reflect, ponder and respond to Jesus' great outpouring of love on the cross.

St. Martin's Episcopal Preschool Chapel Program

The chapel program at St. Martin's preschool academy incorporates the Shell curriculum from Virginia Theological Seminary. Godly Play storytelling, simple creeds, songs and prayers are a part of the chapel worship service. Special events such as "the blessing of the stuffed animals" and visits from "saints" of the church make chapel a part of the wonderful program at St. Martin's Episcopal Preschool. *Average Daily Chapel Attendance: 30*

Service Sundays

Service Sundays started in July 2014 by the Episcopal Youth Community to provide sack lunches for the homeless served by Union Gospel Mission of Tarrant County (UGM). Each second Sunday of the month, the teens invite all parishioners, young and old to join in making healthy lunches for UGM. The Mission and Outreach committee at St. Martin's has committed to providing fruit

each month for this ministry. Many members of the parish support Service Sundays with donations of time and talent, driving lunches down to the mission, and providing supplies and funding to keep this ministry going. In 2015, we are looking for ways to extend this ministry. Reaching out to partner with the Roanoke Lion's Club and Edward Jones is the next step in expanding this ministry and involving surrounding businesses and organizations in the community.

In addition to providing lunch for over 100 people each month, a monthly giving campaign was implemented to collect inexpensive, but much needed items like bar soap, toiletries and socks for the people of Union Gospel Mission. These monthly campaigns keep the focus on those in need and teach children and youth that giving is part of "who we are" as Christians.

Vacation Bible School

This amazing outreach ministry touched the lives of over **95 children** and their families. A week spent learning about God's love with games, crafts, theater time and music was a joy and a blessing to St. Martin's parish family. Over 50% of participants came from the St. Martin's Academy and Preschool, one of the largest in-house outreach ministries offered to the community. It takes loads of wonderful volunteers to pull this off! The event ended with a family service featuring a children's liturgy; youth readers topped off this wonderful event!

Episcopal Youth Community

The EYC meets for discussions of faith, prayer, community service and outreach and FUN! This group meets weekly on Wednesday nights for a "study break" with snacks, games and faith exploration. EYC also meets twice a month on Sundays. *Approximately 15 youth are active participants in EYC.*

Special Events

<u>We Built the Tomb</u>: Children and teens worked on creating an eight foot tall tomb of foam board, with jewels and paint to reflect upon during Lent. On Easter, the "stone" was rolled away from the tomb and children and youth saw new way to experience Lent and Easter.

<u>Epiphany Pageant</u>: This wonderful St. Martin's tradition was directed by Patricia Pannell with music performance by organist Christi Hardy. New volunteers bravely joined in to help with this beloved event and new costumes brought some sparkle to this event.

<u>Trunk or Treat</u>: A fun trunk or treat in the church parking lot had children and families munching on candy and having a grand time together. Everyone was invited to dress as modern day saints such as police officers and firefighters. <u>Saints Parade</u>: The "modern day" saints of St. Martin's paraded with much pomp on All Saints Sunday with a performance by the newly established youth musicians group.

<u>Advent Festival</u>: The Sixth Annual Advent Festival was held, teaching families how to "take Advent home" with them. From greening advent wreaths, to offering ways to celebrate Advent at home, children and families kicked off the season of Advent.

<u>Elves Feast</u>: This wonderful tradition at St. Martin's had a tiny little elf very busy during December. Elvish did find time to pop up on the church website and Facebook a bit with his adventures in preparing the feast.

<u>Blessing of the Animals</u>: This outdoor service blessed every scale, bit of fur and little wet puppy nose. A teen-led bake sale to benefit the Humane Society of North Texas brought in needed funds to help animals.

<u>Easter Egg Hunt</u>: Teen led, this explosion of eggs makes for an amazingly joyful hunt for children and families celebrating the risen Lord! The flowering cross and pictures in the grass add to the joy of Easter day.

<u>Fun Faith Field Day</u>: This event is a great way to start and end each Sunday school year. Featuring Bible stories, field games and an outdoor Eucharist, this special event celebrates the special ministry of children and youth Sunday school and invites the entire parish family to participate.

Altar Guild

The duty of the Altar Guild is to prepare all things necessary for the celebration of the Eucharist or any of the other sacraments of the church including baptisms, weddings and funerals. Working under the direction of the Rectors we prepare the Altar for the Eucharist and take care of the vestments, linens, frontals, vessels, and acolyte equipment.

Our guild is divided into four teams. Grow the Church Ministry

Grow the Church ministry was established in 2014 to assist in expanding existing ministries and offering new ministry opportunities to St. Martin-in-the-Fields and the surrounding community. Hope Group of Narcotics Anonymous

Hope Group will be celebrating 9 years at St. Martin-in-the-Fields Episcopal Church on Memorial Day weekend this year. We started with three members and one meeting per week. The group's last major change was to go to meetings seven days a week. This was a very important change since an addict is advised to attend at least 90 meetings in 90 days & have a home group. When a group has a meeting every day, a member is more likely to continue to come to that meeting. Our Saturday meeting proved to be unsupported after trying a couple of different time slots & was discontinued a couple of months ago.

This past year we were provided a dedicated meeting space. We now meet in the "library," off the East Parish Hall, next to the EYC Room. Occasionally there is a conflict of room space due to the Wednesday night programs but we've been able to work around it for the most part. We consider it a good thing when it's a tight fit for everyone to sit in the room!

Recently, we've had a down-tick of attendance which is not unusual. Due to the small size of Hope Group, we do feel the attendance drop more acutely than other groups do. This means that on some nights only 2 - 4 people will come for a meeting. Fortunately, since this is a common occurrence, we anticipate attendance to increase again soon.

On the second Sunday of the month, we have our "Birthday Night" recognizing milestones of recovery...30, 60 and 90 days, 6 and 9 months, 1 year, 18 months and multiple years. We recognize the celebrants then have a speaker from the area to share their experience, strength & hope.

We are also fortunate to be allowed to host our area business meeting approximately once per year & occasional area events and fundraisers here at St. Martin's.

We appreciate and are grateful for the ability St. Martin's has given us to have an NA group here. The next nearest groups are in Denton, Watauga & Hurst so for some people, this is the only group they can get to.

Mission and Outreach

Mission & Outreach efforts in 2014 included quarterly donations to the following groups: Presbyterian Night Shelter, Union Gospel Mission, Meals on Wheels and Community Storehouse. An effort was made to help the neediest in our community and was focused on Union Gospel Mission. In support of EYC efforts, Mission & Outreach provided funds to add a banana to each of the 100 lunches made on Service Sunday each month.

Matching funds provided by the Fort Worth Episcopal Diocese allowed us to make donations that included \$1,000 to the Presbyterian Night Shelter to provide new socks to the 650 homeless people they serve on a daily basis. We also provided \$1,000 in new Kiva funds, which makes micro loans to people all over the world. Funds were split with \$500 to Mission & Outreach and the matching funds of \$500 to be handled by St. Martin's Episcopal Youth Community. Mission & Outreach supported and added coats to St. Martin's School as well as sharing the drive with Soccer United. Over 160 coats were delivered to Union Gospel Mission in December.

Elizabeth Hunter led the effort on Christmas Angels which purchased gifts for children at A-1 Academy in Dallas, a charter school which has many economically disadvantaged students.

Henry Penner, Joy Malmgren and Ron Hitchcock were all involved in purchasing shoes for the men of Union Gospel Mission. This was made possible, in part, by matching funds from the Fort Worth Diocese. In addition, socks were purchased and will be distributed in January when the shoes are delivered to UGM. Cloth bags purchased in 2013 were distributed in 2014 with the church's name and Episcopal Shield for use in bringing grocery items for donation as well as

providing a way to get the name of St. Martin-in-the-Field's name out into the community.

Members of the Mission & Outreach Team thank the church for supporting our efforts on behalf of all parishioners to be Jesus Christ's heart, hands and feet to those in our community.

Nursery

Using the Faithweaver Now curriculum as well as stories from the Children's Bible, the children in the nursery are learning about God each week. The nursery currently serves an average of 8 children on Sundays, ages o-3 years old. Morning prayer and a craft are part of every class. This year, Mayra Carballo took over as Nursery Director, and Georgeann Donald came on board as Assistant Nursery Director.

Prayer Shawl

The purpose of the Prayer Shawl Ministry is to prepare and coordinate delivery of blessed prayer shawls to the families of the deceased and anyone else who may need extra loving support. We are also working with American Hospice to comfort family members of those in hospice care and Prayer Shawls 4 Fallen Soldiers (PS4FS) to provide prayer shawls to the families of soldiers who have been killed in action.

Prayer Shawls can be crocheted, knitted, quilted or fringed & tied. They can be any color, and created for men, women and/or children. What makes the shawls special are the personal prayers that are said during the creation for the comfort of the recipient. Each shawl is then tagged with a message of encouragement and support. Once finished, they are collected at the church until we have a sufficient quantity to be blessed during Sunday services. Once blessed, they are stored together at the church until the need arises.

Since its inception in May 2008, we have blessed over 250 prayer shawls. In 2008, we delivered 5 shawls. In 2009 we delivered 20 shawls. In 2010 we delivered 47 and in 2011 we delivered 31. Continuing to reach out, we delivered another 25 in 2012. We supported PS4FS with 4 shawls in 2009, 30 in 2010 and 11 in 2011. Fortunately, the need with PS4FS has declined and none were sent in 2012. In 2014 we sent several shawls to families of fallen soldiers and started a new outreach with the Union Gospel Mission, taking several dozen of the fleece shawls/scarves down with a message of God's love attached. We continue to monitor the PS4FS need as well as that of the community and stand ready and willing to contribute when there is a need.
