# The Minutes from St. Martin-in-the-Fields Episcopal Church 2022 Annual Meeting

January 29, 2023

The Annual Meeting of St. Martin-in-the-Fields Episcopal Church was held January 29, 2023, in the church room, following the 9:30 AM service. Prior to the meeting the Rector announced that St. Martin's is dedicated to saving resources as much as possible. In light of this fact church members are directed to the Annual Meeting booklet on the church website. There are printed copies of the booklet at the end of every pew for those who prefer those. He advised all members to read the reports from the many ministries of St. Martin's.

A quorum being present the meeting opened at 11:15 AM with prayer by the Rev. Alan Bentrup, Rector, who chaired the meeting.

#### **Election of a Clerk**

DJ Mitchell moved Glenda Morehead be elected clerk for the meeting. Mary Anderson seconded the motion and Morehead was elected.

#### **Introduction of Current Vestry Members**

Current Vestry members present were introduced and acknowledged by a round of applause. by the parish members present. Those whose terms end today are Bob Garrity, Keen Haynes, Jim McManic and Linda Seeber. Those going off the Vestry were presented with "St. Augustine's Prayerbook" by the Rector

#### 2023 Vestry Election

The nominees for vestry were selected by the Nominating Committee and were elected by acclamation. Those elected to 3-year terms are the following: Mary Beth Butler, Bryan Hedrick, Elizabeth Jordan, and Richard Seeber. Becky Snell-Bolerjack was elected to serve out the final year of an individual who resigned. All were acknowledged by a round of applause.

#### 2023 Delegate Election

As a congregation in the Episcopal Diocese of Texas (EDOT) St. Martin's is entitled to 4 delegates to the diocesan Council. Five individuals have been nominated. One of the 5 will be chosen alternate delegate. That selection will be done among those elected. The nominees for delegate were elected by acclamation. They are Christine Gehringer, Keen Haynes, Suzanne Lincoln, Ed McGlaston and Linda Seeber.

#### Senior Warden's Remarks

Keen Haynes reminded those in attendance that he was appointed Senior Warden by the Rev Scot McComas who left St. Martin's to answer the call from another parish. Haynes served during the interim - the search, and selection and call of the Rev. Alan Bentrup. When a new rector comes it is the duty of the senior warden to stay in place to help the new person settle into the job. During his tenure he found the members of St. Martin's to be even more loving, accepting and willing to work than he had thought. He thanked especially Rebecca and Ronnie for their patience when senior warden duties had to take first place. He plans more family time as he leaves office. He was given a round of applause.

#### **Rector's Remarks**

The Rector reviewed the statistics of services conducted remarking that attendance has risen almost to pre-pandemic levels. He thanked church members for their dedication to help broaden the reach of the church not only nearby but also in giving and working in other places. He stated that as a part of EDOT, St. Martin's will have access to more assistance than previously. EDOT has a strong curacy program and St. Martin's has applied to be a part of the program. If selected St. Martin's could have a curate in place shortly after June. He expressed his personal thanks to everyone for the welcome and support he and his boys continue to receive. He received a round of applause.

#### **Financial Report**

DJ Mitchell recommended all read the complete financial reports in the Annual Report booklet. He remarked that in his experience St. Martin's financial position has never been better. Income has been up, and expenses have been down. The future looks good.

#### **Commissioning of Vestry**

The Rector commissioned the Vestry members for the coming year, and the congregation pledged their support.

#### **Adjournment**

Bob Bess moved the meeting be adjourned, DJ Mitchell seconded the motion and the meeting was adjourned at 11:45 AM with prayer by the Rev. Alan Bentrup.




# MISSION & OUTREACH

























#### **Curate's Report - The Rev. Gavin Tomlin**

#### Ministry Highlights:

- 1. Formation: Since September, I have been leading a Bible Study through the Acts of the Apostles, going slowly through, at this point, the first four chapters, and going deeply into the language, context, and themes we find there. In December, for Advent, we took a break from the Acts Bible Study to the Gospel of Mark, in preparation for the coming lectionary year. For Lent, this year, we will be looking at different Atonement Theories (the meaning and purpose of Jesus' Crucifixion), before returning to the Acts Bible Study after Lent.
- 2. Preaching: I have gotten the opportunity to preach about twice per month, learning from Alan how to hone my own voice and style in the pulpit.
- 3. Pastoral Care: In the last few months, I have started to take on more responsibility when it comes to pastoral care in the parish, and am learning how to balance that and the rest of the my responsibilities, and how to best care for the people in our parish.
- 4. Priestly Learning: Overall, I have found myself more than grateful to be in this church, this place, with these people, learning how to be a priest, how to be a pastor, preaching, teaching, and caring for those entrusted to me. I am still learning how to balance administrative duties (admittedly, not something I'm great at) and the other parts of my job, but I am grateful for the patience and kindness that I have been lucky enough to receive.

## Senior Warden's Report - Bob Bess

It is so exciting to look back on 2023. We have spent time and money to set the upgrade on our facilities in motion. Phase 1 which will include moving our church offices into the education building and upgrading the kitchen & restrooms and relocating our nursery will begin by June of 2024. We have further plans to remodel and improve the church and current office space in the near future.

During 2023 we welcomed The Reverend Gavin Tomlin to our staff in the position of Curate. Your vestry worked closely with Father Alan and the Diocese of Texas to enroll in the curacy program. We will soon host Gavin's ordination to the priesthood while he continues to benefit from the leadership and mentoring of Father Alan. We also welcomed Tony Kroll, seminarian, who has joined our staff to expand his knowledge of The Episcopal Church as he completes his seminary education. It is important to remember that we as a congregation are also instrumental in the development of Gavin and Tony. Your support and interaction with them is a very important part of their learning experiences here at St. Martin-in-the-Fields.

It has been my pleasure to serve as a Senior Warden with Father Alan. He is a kind and gentle leader. Throughout this year I have watched him welcome people to our parish, help people find a place in our church where they can serve and contribute. He continues to lead us forward in very positive ways.

My thanks to Father Alan, his staff, our Junior Wardens, Clerk of the Vestry, members of the vestry, finance committee, stewardship committee and everyone else who contributes to the growth and success of St. Martin-in-the Fields Episcopal church.

## Junior Warden's Report - Rick Schulz and Dick Seeber

The Junior Wardens help with the maintenance and upkeep of St. Martin's buildings and grounds.

Here are some of the projects we completed or oversaw:

- Received two quotes for repairing the parking lot cracks. One for approx. \$4,000 and the other for over \$8,000. The Vestry will need to vote on which way we want to go.
- Canary Construction has agreed to pay for the damaged main line. Awaiting a signed release
  form from the church before the check will be released. Advised Canary Construction to email the documents to Bob Bess, who will sign and have the documents notarized.
- Worked with Ernie Plumbing to repair both urinals in the Parish Hall Bathroom (they were leaking, draining slowly and continually running). Work completed with two new flushing systems and cleaning out the drain lines. Approximate cost \$1,800.
- Installed temporary fix on missing door lock in the Parish Hall Ladies room stall door.
- Memorial Garden Gate Hard to Close. Readjusted Gate 3/5/23
- Sign Blown off Wall near Blue Door. Temporary fix completed pending mason drilling and permanent screws installed.
- Hinge on Lending Book Library Broken. Repaired hinge.
- Light Repair needed in Electrical Closet. Repaired Light Assembly,
- Ed McGlaston replaced Flag Pole rope
- Lock changed to Numerical on Memorial Garden Door
- AC System in Small Parish Hall Repaired (Motor replaced)
- Removed door stop from rear door in office area
- Replaced all church air filters
- Removed middle fence from playground
- Had professional landscaper mow, weed, trim and clean playground
- Installed drip irrigation system around Labyrinth
- Replaced doorknob to Gavin's office
- Replaced all air filters in Parish Hall
- Two more AC problems in Parish Hall fixed (Kitchen and Godly Play Room)
- Sidewalk ADA identified; problems fixed

## **Director of Family Ministries Report - Liza Goodner**

Children's Ministry had a wonderful 2023! The children enjoyed participating in Feast Day Celebrations and Fellowship events such as the Epiphany Pageant, the Easter Festival, Vacation Bible School, Trunk-or-Treat, and Advent and Christmas Festivities. There was great fun and fellowship, and as always, we look forward to more growth and training for children and adults in 2023.

**Godly Play** storytellers and doorkeepers met with children each Sunday at 9:30 am, while parents attended adult Formation classes. We saw an average of six to eight children each Sunday. We added 2 new stories to the Godly Play lesson curriculum, including Sarah, and St. Nicholas of Myra. During Advent, children learned the historical meaning of St. Nicholas, noting the important difference between the Saint and Santa Claus - the modernized version of the two. Our plan is to add more Saint and Godly Play accessories and stories to the Godly Play room this year. Thank you to all who have supported this amazing Ministry!

**The Nursery** also had a great 2023. Gretchen Shaw joined the Nursery staff team, while Rose Ackley and Katy Gott continued to serve as Nursery co-directors. They have consistently welcomed more babies and toddlers each Sunday, with rising numbers each week! We are truly blessed with a wonderfully Nursery - thank you to all who have supported this dynamic ministry!

**Children's Chapel** during the 10:30 service saw consistent participation in 2023, averaging 14 children and youth each Sunday. Claire Abraham delivered beautiful sermons, relaying the lectionary readings. Following the lesson, youth assisted younger children with a craft. Older children have experienced a deeper meaning of the lessons they've received as a younger child, as well as helping out children with craft lessons that reinforce lessons. Children's Chapel also enjoyed outreach Lenten and Gratitude lessons, with craft activities and donations of Lent offerings to the Episcopal Church. Children were also engaged in lessons for Stewardship in November.

Episcopal Youth Community (EYC) participated in Service Sunday, and readings and music during the 10:30 worship service for Vacation Bible school and Veteran's Day Sundays. Teens were crew leaders for Vacation Bible School and are already preparing for Scuba VBS this June! Ten youth really enjoyed their end of school year celebration in May at Urban Air. An average of six youth participated in EYC activities this year. Teens are making plans to serve at City Week in June to Union Gospel Mission and to 4Saints Episcopal Food Pantry. We are looking forward to planning the youth calendar for 2024, including weekly gather-



ings, VBS, Diocesan summer camp and a big trip to the National Episcopal Youth Event in 2026!

## **Music Ministry Report - Robert Duquesnel**

From my perspective, the Music Ministry is flourishing at our parish! The joy of the Gospel of our Savior, Jesus Christ, in union with God the Father and the Holy Spirit, is reflected in the collective voices of our worship.

The principal choir, the congregation, sings confidently, and is willing to explore Episcopal music resources that we have available.

The choir has seen some new members, and remains welcoming to those who are only able to attend intermittently. We have made use of our present choral library for anthems and preludes, and have recently supplemented this with Oregon Catholic Press's "Spirit and Song" hymnbook. This contemporary resource is scripture based, and will also be enjoyed by our youth and guitarists.

## Individual Ministry Reports (in alphabetical order)

#### **4Saints Episcopal Food Pantry - Jim McManic**

4Saints Episcopal Food Pantry is a food distribution ministry conducted in East Fort Worth by five Episcopal parishes. Our purpose is to serve with dignity and humility, helping to meet the nutritional needs of those seeking assistance. We are a 100% volunteer organization, and members of St. Martins actively volunteer. Also, St. Martin's is one of the founding parishes.

#### **4Saints Programs**

Every Friday, 4Saints distributes food to about 170+ families from its location at the Community Life Center, 2529 Mt. View Ave, Fort Worth, TX 76103.

In addition to Fridays, the Mobile Pantry distributes food to about 200 families every fourth Saturday of the month in the parking area located across from the Community Life Center.

4Saints has added a Senior Food box program providing additional food for senior citizens. We help close to 900 families each month or about 4500 individuals. This is a definition of outreach.

#### **Recent Accomplishments**

- 4Saints is assisting 170+ families each Friday compared to about 80 a year ago.
- The pantry location moved from Texas Wesleyan University to the Mt. View location.
- 4Saints is developing plans to meet weekly distribution to over 190 families.

#### **How Does St. Martin's Support 4Saints?**

We are now nicknamed "St. Martin's in the Corn Field," as we have provided over 2300 cans
of corn in addition to other food items and hygiene

items.

- We have contributed close to 20 very full reverse Advent boxes this year.
- The Red Envelopes have raised over \$7,500 this year.
- Several parishioners are very actively volunteering every week; with more becoming involved each month.

## **Acolytes - Deneice Wood**

The Acolyte ministry is growing. We have approximately 25 members that range in age from 7 to adult. We serve at both the 8:30 and 10:30 am services every Sunday and any other services as requested. Our training time was on the 2nd Sunday of the month but has moved to the 4th Sunday of the month for 2024. We welcome all those would like to learn to serve at the altar.

#### Al-Anon - Evie Larimore

As per Father Alan, we are agreed that Al-Anon will no longer be considered a "ministry" of St. Martin in the Fields. We do meet in the Parish Hall and do serve the community, but are not a "ministry."

#### Altar Guild - Linda Seeber

Altar Guild is a ministry that prepares all things necessary for the celebration of the Eucharist or any other sacraments of the church including baptisms, weddings and funerals, working with



the directions from the Clergy.

We all work together during Holy week and Christmas to share the work. We have 4 teams that rotate the duties of the Altar Guild.

#### **Band of Moms - Liza Goodner**

The Band of Moms continued its original vision of serving the need for a safe place for moms of all ages and stages to share their experiences of motherhood. 2023 was wonderful year of being together and welcoming some new Moms to the group!

Six to eight Moms met at restaurants this year, one including a "new to us" breakfast place! We really enjoyed having meaningful conversations and supporting one another. We wrapped up the year by having a Christmas potluck and gift exchange party!

The BOMS hopes to include more activities this year such as attending dinner in the evenings, Moms Night outs, and service projects. The group currently meets the first Sunday of every month after the 10:30 service, at a local restaurant.



## BSA Troop 937 - Liza Goodner, Chartered Organization Representative

2023 was another productive and amazing year for Troop 937! The scouts enjoyed monthly themed campouts at St. Martin's and a week long summer campout at Camp Hale Scout Camp in Talihina, Oklahoma. Merit badges were accomplished through the District's Merit Badge College at Tarrant County College. Many other educational and fun campouts for the scouts included a Gaming/Recruiting campout, Road to First Class campout, Cooking campout, Scuba Discovery class, and Camporee and Score-O Council Campouts.

The Troop contributed countless service hours, the majority of those hours benefitting the grounds of St. Martin's. Scouts cleaned up trash along Pearson Lane, and the fields of St. Martin's as part of the Adopt a Street program. Scouts also served in St. Martin's worship services for Scout Sunday in February.

Scouts conducted food drives, collecting lots of food and popcorn for 4Saints Episcopal Food Pantry. Four scouts completed their Eagle projects, including the Lending Library, new Picnic tables, and the Labyrinth border update at St. Martin's! The scouts helped supervise the bounce house again at the second annual Easter Festival at St. Martin's! The parish was also delighted to see Scouts had a booth again at Trunk or Treat - the Troop was readily available to help when the event moved indoors with rain pouring outside.

## **Service Sunday Sue Ellen McMichael**

Service Sunday is an intergenerational ministry that welcomes all. We make and deliver 120 sack lunches for the homeless population at Union Gospel Mission of Tarrant County (UGM). On average we have 20 volunteers meet monthly on the second Sunday after the 10:30 service to prepare the lunches. In 2023 we made and delivered approximately 1,440 lunches. One sack lunch consists of a banana, chips, water, cookies, a cereal bar, a peanut butter and jelly sandwich and a napkin. Throughout the year we reach out to UGM's outreach coordinator for feedback to make sure our lunches are still meeting their needs. Some of the enhancements made so far are: Seasonal items such as hand warmers during the the winter months. Handwritten cards with Bible verses and prayers to encourage people during hard times. Bread pudding prepared with the bread loaves ends that are not used for the sandwiches. Anyone is welcome to help. Just come by the parish hall on the second Sunday of each month.

#### Schedulers - Becky Snell

Schedulers are 4 volunteers that manage the online program for the volunteers using the Ministry Scheduler Pro software [MSP]. We coordinate with church staff and all the other Ministry Leaders to publish and keep current the monthly volunteer schedule calendar.

In 2023 we provided 3 group training programs for volunteers at St. Martin's regarding how Ministry Leaders and volunteers can utilize the online tool. Making and volunteering for substitute requests within a Ministry, documenting dates a volunteer is unable to serve, updating personal profile data, and Ministry Leaders placing their volunteers into service positions. Also multiple hours throughout the year are spent in individual instructions or assistance through phone, text, and email.

Since COVID the Schedulers have not met in person to create the skeleton schedule month, but coordinate through electronic media with each other and parish staff utilizing notes from the program meetings held 2-3 times yearly. These skeleton schedules are provided to the Ministry Leaders to allow input and them to either schedule their volunteers into the service positions or verify the pre-assignments are correct. The goal is then to have the completed month schedule able to be published online to all the volunteers on the 15th of the month prior, to allow for planning and any needed substitution requests to be processed through the system that then emails all eligible volunteers that a position is available if they wish to volunteer.

In 2023 the Schedulers assisted coordinating volunteers for 156 regular services and special services.

#### Sisters of the Spirit - Kerry Angle

Sisters of the Spirit is essentially a book club. We meet weekly, Mondays at 1pm in the small parish hall, to discuss a portion of the book we are currently reading. We have lunch beforehand at11:15 am at a local restaurant for those who are able to make it. We also have parties and go on outings to movies and museums and so forth. Any ladies who would like to come and hang out with us are very welcome.

#### Spiritual Awareness - Flo Lowrey

For years a small group of seekers has met every week on Thursday mornings to share how God is working in their lives. We meet in the Chapel from 10:00 - 11:00 am.

The group welcomes anyone who wishes to participate.

We have used a number of books and publications to prompt our sharing. We are currently using the Forward Day by Day publication as a springboard for our discussions. We always are free to share events in our daily lives where we see the movement of God.

## Stephen Ministry - Deborah Diehl

Stephen Ministry provides one-on-one caregiving to congregation members going through difficult times. We provided 151 total hours of one-on-one caregiving. Stephen Ministers completed 2 hours of continuing education and participated in 23 hours of supervision meetings. Our Stephen Leader completed 6 hours of continuing education this year.

Stephen Ministry distributed the Grief Book series to 7 families.

Finally, Stephen Ministers provided Healing Prayers at 52 Sunday services.

## **Ushers - Kerry Angle**

The usher guild helps to ensure that all services at St. Martin's run as smoothly as possible. Ushers also welcome people to the service, provide assistance to any in the congregation who need help during the service, and tidy up afterward. We currently have 24 active ushers, but we are always ready to welcome new members to our guild.

## **Treasurer's Report 2023**

# Financial Notes for the Year-end 2023 St. Martin-in-the-fields Episcopal Church

As of December 31, 2022, the Unrestricted Cash Fund totaled \$46,338, less \$35,300 in pledge contributions for 2023, leaving an Unrestricted Cash Fund balance from 2022 operations of \$11,038. As of December 31, 2023, the Unrestricted Cash Fund balance was \$141,692, less \$50,050 in pledge contributions for 2024 leaving an Unrestricted Cash Fund balance from 2023 operations of \$91,642\*.

Revenues from all sources for the year totaled \$512,949. Pledge income for the year was \$8,575 under plan, a shortfall of .097%. However, non-pledge income exceeded plan by \$27,189 and Plate income exceeded plan by \$3,932. Christmas offerings totaled \$10,869 and the Thanksgiving offering totaled \$4,680. Total income from the grant to help pay the cost of our Curate was \$20,213, consistent with the Diocesan commitment.

Total operating expenses for the year equaled \$432,082. In December they totaled \$46,479 which was \$12,451 under plan. In December:

- Buildings and Grounds expenses were under plan by \$5,119, primarily because our insurance premium was paid in November but budget for payment in December.
- Office expenses exceeded plan by \$651, due entirely to purchase of office equipment that
  was budgeted to be purchased in February.
- Communication expenses were under plan by \$22.
- Worship expenses were over plan by \$173, due to Altar Guild, Lectionary Insert, and Liturgy expenses being over plan.
- Program expenses were under plan by \$14,565.
- Payroll expenses exceeded plan by \$6,399, entirely due to the way we budgeted the Curate's salary and pension, as described in previous monthly financial reports and higher than budgeted staff medical insurance expenses.

Total end-of-year expenses were over plan by \$10,597. Buildings and Grounds expenses exceeded plan by \$1,110; Office expenses by \$353; Communications by \$654; Worship by \$384 and Payroll by \$19,086, due almost exclusively to the way the Curate's expense were budgeted and the increase in the cost of the rector's pension. However, Program expenses were under plan by \$10,345 and miscellaneous by \$841.

Net Income exceeded plan by \$42,396, as income exceeded plan substantially more than expenses did.

\*Includes a minor but cumulatively favorable change in assets and liabilities of \$263.
